



THE STORY OF THE NIGERIAN QUEER ACTIVIST

It is not news that Queer
Nigerians are standing up for
their rights and it is interesting to
watch, on this Edition of hints
magazine we interviewed
Vincent Desmond, a writer and
founder the Digital publication
Dear Queers.

A quick introduction about you?

I once asked the question 'what is my brand?' on Twitter and from the results I gathered that my personal brand is something along the lines of "A Beyoncé loving queer writer who writes and talks about being queer a lot and fashion". and I think that is the most accurate description of my personal brand I have ever gotten.



So, my name is Vincent Desmond, I am a fashion and culture journalist who writes and talks a lot about what my life and experiences as a queer person living in Nigerian who tweets about Beyoncé a little too much.

What's the motivation behind Dear Queers?

When I was younger and experiencing puberty as a queer man, I had so many questions and there was pretty much nowhere to get answers. Everyone around me was cis and straight, almost everything on TV was cis and straight, no one gave me the queer version of a sex education, no one introduced me to literature that had characters like me. When I started Dear Queers, I wanted to create a publication that helped other queer people especially younger queer people navigate this predominantly cis and straight world. Even if it's just by putting them on a playlist of music by other queer people, or uplifting voices of other LGBTQ+ people or starting conversations. Our lives are hard enough, I want to make it easier, so I created Dear Queers.

What unique milestone has Dear Queers achieved as it relates to the objective of the brand?

Almost every other day, I get a DM from someone talking about how grateful they are the platform exists, or how they can relate to a particular article or a post starts a very interesting conversation online and that makes me happy because Dear Queers is meant for other queer people to engage with, learn from, and relate to and honestly, it does that. And I am very happy about that.

What does it mean to be an openly queer man in Nigeria?

It kind of means a lot. For me, being openly but most importantly visibly queer in Nigeria means being ready for homo/queerphobia in real life and online. It is scary. I constantly have Nigerians clogging up my notifications on Twitter telling me vile and homophobic things and most days, I don't care but somedays, what they say strikes a nerve. Other days, they take it up the notch and make threats that leave me worried. In real life, it is easier to handle because it doesn't escalate more than the other members of my department making jokes about my being and acting like a woman (I think, this is because I am not really friends with or hang with straight people a lot). But it also means liberation, it means living unapologetically, I live my life as authentically as possible and I love it. I know if I die today, I at least lived. I lived my truth.



Do you think people are born queer or choose to be queer?

I think whatever happened to straight people that made them straight is what happened to queer people that made us queer. I personally don't remember choosing, I just remember being queer and knowing I was queer. If it was a choice, I doubt many would choose to be queer knowing and seeing how much hate and violence we are subjected just for our identities. When did it dawn on you, the reality of your queer sexuality? I personally don't remember not knowing I was queer. I just didn't know the word for it when I was younger. By the time I was six, I had found my label, by accident, in one of those mini dictionaries and I knew it was correct. I remember telling my cousins, they laughed of course. I think even though I figured it pretty early, the people around me had figured it out earlier that I wasn't straight because I was always different. The kids at school for one knew.

How did you come out to the people that mattered (parents, friends) and at what point did you consider this necessary?

The first time I came out to anyone, it was my best friend in secondary school. I was maybe eleven, I kind of just said it to be honest and he just accepted it. The last time, I had to 'come out' was when I came out to my mum and I sat down and tried to have a conversation about what it means to be a queer (keyword here being tried). In case you're wondering, she was very homophobic so there's that. I don't think I came out in the traditional sense to anyone else including my boss, course mates and friends because I am not in a closet. If you ask, I tell you, I am really open about it.

Can you describe your worst homophobic experience and how did you come out of that?

I can't say what my 'worst homophobic experience' was but it could be when I was in Benin Republic and my course mates would routinely make jokes about me being gay, and referred to me as a girl and when the class was to be divided according to gender, they told me to go to where 'the other girls' were. I think what made it bad was that it didn't stop, it just started and never stopped until I dropped out (for other reasons). It was how casual it was; I could be having a great day and someone would make a joke reminding me that I was 'not a real man' maybe because of my femininity or something of the sorts. Eventually, it led to me spiraling and becoming depressed as well is one of the major reasons I am anti-social.

Has being queer affected or hindered you from practicing your religion in anyway?

Being queer makes you look at things differently, religion is one of those things. When you've spent your whole life being told that God hates you because you are an abomination, being religious may not come easily. Personally, I was born into a Christian home but at nineteen, I don't quite know if I am a Christian or agnostic. My queerness may have not hindered me from being a Christian, but it made me question Christianity and organized religion because why would God who is love condemn me for being me?

What do you think about Bisexuality?

My opinion about bisexuality doesn't matter. I am nowhere on the bisexual spectrum, so my opinion on bisexuality doesn't or shouldn't matter. Bisexuals are valid, bisexuality is valid even though a good number of the rest of the queer community doesn't see them that way and most straight people invalidate their sexuality and tell bisexual people that they are just gay when they aren't.

What notion do you hope would change about how people perceive homosexuals?

Homosexuals are hypersexualized by the media, by straight people and by everything. People always reduce us to our sexual activities and that is very dehumanizing because while there isn't anything wrong with sex but our lives don't begin and end with sex, we are human beings and I frankly want the notion that homosexuality begins and ends with who you sleep with.

Have you been physically assaulted from being gay?

The closest I have come to being physically assaulted for being gay has to be when I was bullied in primary school. As an adult, I have never been assaulted physically. I think I have been really lucky because I know people who have horror stories to tell.

If there is someone out there looking to come out but is afraid, what advise will you give them?

Everyone's coming out is different and unique to themselves and their journeys but one thing I'll say is: pace yourself, ensure you're ready. Coming out doesn't magically make things better or easier so make sure you're ready and you are coming out for yourself and no one else




KEMI 'LALA' AKINDOJU & CHEF FREGZ

Even till now, we can testify to how easeful their life is, as we hardly hear any news nor see pictures of these two flaunting their love in our faces.




ADESUA ETOMI & BANKY W

THE CURIOUS CASE OF BOBRISKY



GAY? TRANS? WHO IS HE/SHE?

Idris Okuneye (27), a graduate of Unilag and popularly known as Bobrisky has been the subject of various discourse and controversies in the news.

Is Bobrisky gay? Is he a Trans? What and who is Bob?

However, to even attempt to give answers to any of these questions one must be open to the following concepts around this conversation:

GENDER EXPRESSION

When you are born, the doctor assigns gender to you based on your body features.

As you grow, one begins to culturally exhibit what they consider a personal expression of that gender. This is called gender expression.

Therefore, not every one of the same sex express it the same — giving rise to different social expressions in names, dressing, pronoun choices, etc.

The habits and characteristics of individuals leading up to the use of adjectives like masculine, feminine, androgynous and everything in between.



GENDER IDENTITY & BIOLOGICAL SEX

Gender identity is a much fuller philosophy as it deals with the internal knowledge and perception of oneself.

That is, how a person sees his or herself regardless of what is on the gender lines of their birth certificates.

Africans typically have a gender binary — the assumption that there are only two genders, male or female (biological sex). And it is physically verifiable by the eyes.

Research has shown the blurriness between these distinct categories causing a lot to rethink what they consider to be their gender identity.

TRANSGENDER vs. SEXUAL ORIENTATION

Transgender people are people whose gender identity is different from the gender assigned to them at birth.

So, some person labelled male or female at birth could turn out to ascribe different sex to themselves.

A transition from one gender to the other could be a lifelong process — from overcoming stereotypes, fighting social stigmatization and finally physical transition.

With our case study, Bobrisky, who started as a cross-dresser before showing shreds of evidence of biological transformation, one can identify processes of a trans that makes us begin to consider the possibility of more like her out here.

Social transitioning — this happens in the way you dress, how you ask to be addressed, and in coming out to close friends about your gender identity.

Biological transitioning — a transgender person may not necessarily transition because it is quite expensive or they can't deal with the attention of societal scrutiny.

Noteworthily; this has nothing to do with one's sexual orientation (meaning the sex to whom a person is attracted.)

A Trans-female who is attracted to a male cannot be referred to as gay even though they were assigned male at birth.

Also, when confused about what pronoun to use in addressing Bobrisky or any Trans you know, the best way is to call them by what they identify as (in Bobrisky's case: SHE). Or ask how they prefer you addressed them. Societal constructs made it hard to be receptive of people's dilemmas and struggles and respect their submissions. And an openly trans person has courageously surpassed the hurdles of criticism and stereotypes to teach us something very crucial about life — Be yourself.

This is why with Bob, identifying opening as Nigeria's first Trans woman she is no longer such a risky role model after all.
